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THE FIRST SESSION OF THE 56TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, BUDGET DEFICIT DEFINES SESSION AGAIN

FOR THE THIRD CONSECUTIVE YEAR, MANEUVERING A MULTIMIL-LION DOLLAR BUDGET DEFICIT IS AT THE FOREFRONT OF THE 2017 LEGISLATIVE SESSION. The first session of

the 56th Oklahoma Legislature began February 6th and included Governor Mary Fallin's seventh State of the State speech. To address Oklahoma's budget and perceived revenue challenges, the governor advocated again for some of the same items she proposed in 2016, including a \$1.50 per pack tax increase on cigarettes. Governor Fallin's FY-18 executive budget also calls for enacting the state sales tax on 164 services not currently taxed as well the abolishment of the state sales tax on groceries and corporate income tax. With regards to transportation, Governor Fallin called for increasing the per gallon gasoline excise tax by 7 cents and the diesel excise tax by 10 cents, while dedicating 100% of all motor fuel tax revenues to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation, saying in the process, 'As we've discussed for decades, let's put the fuel taxes into roads and bridges.' The flip side to the governor's proposal is ODOT's apportionment of individual income tax allocations (ROADS fund) would be returned to the General Revenue Fund for distribution to non-transportation state services. According to the governor the motor fuel and income tax proposals, along with new fees on electric and hybrid vehicles and annual agency appropriations, would allow ODOT's ongoing eight-year highway and bridge construction work plan to continue uninterrupted. While Governor Fallin, Senate President Pro Tempore Mike Schulz, Senate Appropriations Chair Kim David, House Speaker Charles McCall and House Appropriations & Budget Chair Leslie Osborn will largely determine the final FY-18 budget late in the legislative session, lawmakers again face a severe challenge of protecting core government services - transportation, education, human services, public safety, corrections - while continuing to enact reforms that reduce the cost of government and provide quality and efficient service to taxpayers.

In late February, the Oklahoma Department of Management and Enterprise Services declared a revenue failure for the current FY-17 budget

MOTOR VEHICLE FEES REDIRECTED TO

TRANSPORTATION A core TRUST principle is all transportation-derived revenues are used strictly for transportation. TRUST supports returning all motor fuel taxes and the remaining allocation of vehicle-related fees to transportation purposes, and encourages the appropriate allocation of motor vehicle fees to state highways, county roads and municipal streets taking into consideration previous vehicle-related fees and general fund allocations. TRUST will continue to support this concept as a matter of sound public policy.

PROTECT ODOT EIGHT-YEAR HIGHWAY AND BRIDGE CONSTRUCTION WORK PLAN

TRUST's top priority is ensuring funding remains at a level where no current projects are interrupted, no planned projects cut and no motor fuel taxes and vehicle-related transportation fees diverted from ODOT's investment strategy which includes the eight-year construction work plan, the Asset Preservation Plan and highway and bridge maintenance.

SUPPORT THE CONTINUATION OF THE FULL STATUTORY ALLOCATION TO THE

ROADS FUND To continue the replacement and rehabilitation of state highways and bridges, TRUST supports the continuation of statutory allocations to a core business function of the state.

PROTECT COUNTY IMPROVEMENTS FOR ROADS & BRIDGES (CIRB) FIVE-YEAR CONSTRUCTION WORK PLAN To rehabilitate

county bridges and roads, TRUST supports the CIRB program and its revolving fund to be used strictly for CIRB transportation proj-

ects equaling no interruption of current projects, no elimination of planned projects and no diversion of transportation funds.

INFRASTRUCTURE BOND FINANCING

During uncertain budget times TRUST supports infrastructure bond financing to maintain critical transportation funding and projects, and vehemently opposes the diversion of motor fuel taxes and vehicle-related transportation fees to non-transportation uses of state government. If infrastructure bonds are a part of any budget agreement, state leaders must appropriate debt service for the bond payments, rather than require ODOT to make payments from existing revenues.

SINCE 2006, THE LEGISLATURE HAS STEADILY INVESTED IN OKLAHOMA'S TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE, MOST NOTABLY UPGRADING AND MODERNIZING BRIDGES AND HIGHWAYS ACROSS THE STATE, AND TAXPAYERS ARE ENJOYING THE BENEFITS. TRUST HAS BEEN AN ACTIVE VOICE AT THE STATE CAPITOL, AND OUR MEMBERS HAVE WORKED CLOSELY WITH THE LEGISLATURE AND GOVERNOR FALLIN **TO MAKE GENUINE PROGRESS IN** IMPROVING OUR HIGHWAY AND BRIDGE INFRASTRUCTURE. PROTECT TRANSPORTATION-DEDICATED REVOLVING FUNDS TRUST supports the protection of transportation dedicated revolving funds. The funds are intended

TRUST supports innovative and alternative transportation funding that is revenue adequate for the intended purpose and user equitable as part of a comprehensive approach to increase overall transportation funding.

which reduces state agency budgets 0.7% or approximately \$36 million through June 30th. In order to balance the FY-18 budget, the possibility always exists for state leaders to undo years of transportation funding progress by further diverting transportation-generated revenues, such as those intended for the CIRB program, to other areas of state government. TRUST members have stood firm in their opposition to diverting transportation-generated funds, however time will tell this session if lawmakers will maintain their longstanding commitment to proper transportation funding. If they do not, Oklahoma stands to lose tremendous ground in developing and maintaining a first-class, modern surface transportation infrastructure system.

In Washington, the November general election not only brought America a new president, Donald Trump, but a new Secretary of Transportation, Elaine Chao, who was confirmed by the U.S. Senate 93-6.

In late 2015, Congress passed, and former President Obama signed, the FAST Act which is the first long-term federal highway funding bill enacted since 2005. The five-year legislation brings multi-year solvency to the Highway Trust Fund (HTF), which reimburses states for certain highway projects. Long-term stability for the HTF and federal surface transportation programs is a longstanding priority of the TRUST legislative agenda. Oklahoma Senator Jim Inhofe was instrumental in securing passage of the FAST Act as then chairman of the Senate Environment & Public Works Committee. Senator Inhofe remains the ranking Republican on the committee but is not serving as chairman during the current Congress. The members of TRUST are grateful for his continued dedication to ensure Oklahoma continues to receive its allotted share of federal highway dollars.

Also on Capitol Hill, former Oklahoma attorney general Scott Pruitt was confirmed in February by the U.S. Senate 52-46 to serve as director of the Environmental Protection Agency. Both Senator Inhofe and Senator James Lankford endorsed Pruitt's nomination before the EP&W Committee. Upon Pruitt's confirmation, Governor Fallin named former state representative, assistant attorney general and Secretary of State Mike Hunter to serve the remainder of Pruitt's current term as attorney general.

As our 2017 legislative agenda (see page two) states, TRUST will continue to advance many of the same goals advocated over the past decade including our top priority that all transportation-derived revenues be utilized strictly for transportation programs and not allocated for nontransportation government functions. TRUST is at the state Capitol each day to educate legislators on the importance of investing in and protecting Oklahoma's transportation infrastructure, and maintaining transportation at the center of the legislative conversation.

Since 2006, the executive and legislative branches have joined forces to establish transportation as a core priority, and that investment is seen all across Oklahoma in the form of new and refurbished highways and bridges on both the state and county highway systems. Oklahoma's transportation infrastructure system is in a much better place than it was just a few years ago, and our collective progress is a direct result of the investment made by TRUST members.

2017 TRANSPORTATION DAY AT THE CAPITOL
